## **Paper Mosaic Pins Project**



## **Supplies**

- An Assortment of Paper in Many Colors
- Scissors
- Glue
- Pencil
- Cardstock or Cardboard
- Optional: Mod Podge



Start with a simple shape base cut from heavy paper or cardboard: a heart, a circle, a square, a star, etc.



Draw a simple design on your cardboard shape. Create a pattern that is easy to follow or block out sections in a design that is easy to fill in.



Find all sorts of colorful paper. You can use construction paper, decorative paper, or paper from the recycling bin such as mailers, post cards, and magazines. You could even paint paper in lots of colors, and let it dry.

Cut the paper into long strips. Then, cut the strips into small rectangular or square pieces. Feel free to cut sizes as you go, as the design dictates. Keep your colors in separate piles.



Put glue down on one section of your design. Lay your pieces of colorful mosaic paper onto your design as desired. It's okay if they go off the edges. You'll trim those off later.



Once all pieces are glued in place, let it dry for a bit and then trim around the edges.

Optional: if you have Mod Podge or liquid glue, add a layer on top of the paper to give it a sheen.



Hot glue a pin back to the back to make your art wearable.
