

## Linda Dolack Inspired Zero Waste Collage Boxes

Linda Dolack creates art using recycled food packaging as an exploration into the marketing and advertisement that leads a product to become a household name. She covers these boxes in beads and embroidery, enhancing the existing artwork and making a beautiful piece out of something that would otherwise be discarded. Repurpose a box in your home to create a Zero Waste Collage Box of your own.

## **Supplies**

- Recycled box
- Collage materials magazines, color paper, buttons, etc.
- Markers
- Scissors
- Glue



## Instructions:

- 1. Choose a recycled box for a base. Find a cereal or juice box in the kitchen, or look for an empty tissue box to collage!
- Create base layers using paper, magazines, old maps, or other collaging materials.
  You can cover the whole box or leave parts of the original material visible.
- 3. Create texture by adding multiple layers of decorations. Use markers to add words and drawings on top of your collaged pieces.
- 4. Glue the decorations onto the box to create your Zero Waste Collage Box.
