'Incredible' watercolor

Watercolor Wisconsin exhibit showcases diversity

n choosing pieces to submit to the Watercolor Wisconsin 2012 juried exhibition, Harry Wirth wasn't sure how far out on a limb he wanted to

go. The Salem-based artist seriously considered entering one of his more traditional watercolors, along with a more recent - and more radical - "window frame" 2012

painting, in order to balance the scales a bit.

In the end, though, he took a leap by entering two of his newest, fragmented landscapes, in which he "plays" with the concept of a view being obstructed by something such as a window frame. And that decision served Wirth well.

His painting, titled "Point of View," was not only chosen for the show's First Award by the jurors, but as one of three pieces purchased by the Racine Art Museum through the show's Memorial Purchase

Awards program.

Wirth, who is also an architect and a professor of design at Northern Illinois University, said he was shocked and pleasantly surprised by how well his minimalist work fared in the show, which opened on Sunday, Dec. 9, at the Wustum Museum of Fine Arts, 2519 Northwestern Ave. When artists take off in a new direction, as he did while on sabbatical in 2011, they can't be certain how their latest work will be received, he said.

"It seems the show's jurors were openminded," said Wirth (www.harrywirth.com).

Keeping an open mind, in fact, was something that the show's two jurors Jessica Caddell and Richard Born

- agreed they wanted to do in looking at the 287 pieces submitted for Watercolor

Wisconsin 2012, according to Caddell. Rather than having pre-conceived notions or looking for specific criteria, she and Born wanted to be able to base their impressions on what they were seeing, said Caddell, who is the executive director of the Freeport Art Museum, in Freeport, Ill. And what they saw was an impressive

range of high-quality work,

she said.

"Artists are doing incredible things with watercolor in the last 20 years, and you definitely see that in the works submitted for this show," Caddell said. Born, too, said he was pleased with the great diversity of approaches to the medium, and that he hopes the final selection reflects the varied uses of watercolor across artists active in Wisconsin.

"While some artists continue to work along traditional watercolor techniques, others clearly are pushing the boundaries of the medium through rich opacities, impacted surfaces and other approaches that belie the transparency of the waterbased pigments," said Born, who is the senior curator of the Smart Museum of Art at the University of Chicago.

Such range is evident even among the work of the top three award winners which, in addition to Wirth, includes Alice Rossman's "Eastlake" (Second Award) and Patrick Doughman's "The Game of Life" (Third Award). In contrast to Wirth's minimalist approach, Rossman's realistic depiction of a well-worn city street corner, is a very complex, narrative painting, Caddell said. "She's told an entire story in this work," she said. "It's incredible how much is going on in this piece."

Doughman, on the other hand, distorts





the scale of the figures and uses garish colors to create his own vision of men playing cards in "The Game of Life." Exaggerated expressions, along with arms and hands that are out of proportion to the rest of the body, create a distinct mood in this contemporary work.

"Everything in this piece is very skewed, and that messes with our perspective,"

Caddell said.

These are just three of the 119 pieces, by 86 artists, that make up Watercolor Wisconsin 2012. The show, which runs through April 27, also includes more traditional subject matter, ranging from still lifes to scenic scapes, as well as plenty of interesting characters and abstract visions of artists from throughout the state.
