


THE DESIGN MUSEUM hosts "CTRL 'X," a partly retrospective exhibition of the history of the Finnish brand CTRL Clothing from 1995 to the present day. This exhibition reflects Finnish youth fashion culture and the urban scene through CTRL's varied world of design and the history of skateboarding. Head designer Freeman has built the CTRL brand without compromising his style. As a result, CTRL is a forerunner of Finnish youth fashion creating a new and young image of Finland abroad and engaged in important pioneering work for coming brands in Finland. THE NATIONAL ORNAMENTAL METAL MUSEUM presents "Master Metalsmith: Eleanor Moty" through December 2. Eleanor Moty is best known for bringing the photoetching process into the field of metalsmithing and integrating the process into her work. Moty was drawn to jewelry and metalsmithing as an undergraduate at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She completed her graduate work at Tyler School of Art. Moty is the recipient of numerous grants and in 1975 the National Endowment for the Arts Craftsman Fellowship.

THE HOUSTON CENTER FOR CONTEMPORARY CRAFT features "CraftTexas 2012" through December 30. The seventh in a series of biennial juried exhibitions, the show exhibits the best in Texas-made contemporary craft. Featuring works by forty Texas artists, the exhibition includes everything from a large-scale installation of crocheted linen and latex paint to stoneware ceramic vessels and pâte de verre glass sculptures mimicking iron cookware. Jewelry, furniture, sculpture, and glass are among the categories of craft included.

THE HILLWOOD ESTATE, MUSEUM AND GARDENS presents "Prêt-à-Papier: The Exquisite Art of Isabelle de Borchgrave" through December 30. Inspired by the rich history of fashion represented in European paintings, famous costumes in museum collections and designs of the grand couturiers, Isabelle de Borchgrave has turned her passion for painting toward the re-creation of elaborate costumescrumpling, pleating, braiding, and painting the surface of simple rag paper to achieve the effect of textiles and create the illusion of haute couture. By reconstructing dresses from key periods in fashion history, "Prêt-à-Papier" presents a range of styles from the late seventeenth to the early twentieth century.

THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION'S RENWICK GALLERY hosts "40 under 40: Craft Futures" through February 3, 2013. The exhibit features forty artists born since 1972, the year the Smithsonian American Art Museum's contemporary craft and decorative arts program was established at its branch museum, the Renwick Gallery. The exhibition investigates evolving notions of craft within traditional media such as ceramics and metalwork, as well as in fields as varied as sculpture, industrial design, installation art, fashion design, sustainable manufacturing, and mathematics. The range of disciplines represented illustrates new avenues for the handmade in contemporary culture.

THE RACINE MUSEUM features "Cutting Edge: RAM Explores Contemporary Glass Jewelry" through February 17, 2013. Following a historical precedent for utilizing glass in adornment, contemporary artists create dynamic art jewelry that underscores the aesthetic and theoretical potential of an ancient material. This exhibition represents the intersection of two important elements of

artistic production: art jewelry and glass. Whether engaging with long-standing traditions, such as producing milleflore beads, or utilizing glass in equally compelling yet inherently modern conceptual frameworks, these artists emphasize the flexibility and variability of glass as a medium for expression. The exhibition is marked by artists using a variety of techniques and exploring a broad range of subject matter.

THE SCHMUCK MUSEUM IN PFORZHEIM presents "Pearls in the History of Jewellery" through January 27, 2013. By means of historical as well as contemporary examples, including exhibits from Albion Art in Tokyo, the Gulbenkian Museum in Lisbon, Chaumet and Mellerio dits Meller in Paris, the Qatar Museums Authority in Doha, or Tiffany in New York, this exhibition illustrates the multifaceted ways of using pearls to create jewelry and the skilled craftsmanship involved.

GREAT BRITAIN

THE VICTORIA AND ALBERT MUSEUM features "Kitty and the Bulldog: Lolita Fashion and the Influence of Britain" through January 27, 2013. The exhibit explores the way in which British fashion-notably Victoriana, Punk and Gothic—has influenced the development of Japan's "Lolita" style, a cult fashion movement whose defining feature has been its preoccupation with cuteness, or kawaii. The display has nine outfits recently bought in Tokyo for the Museum's permanent collections. Also hosted at the museum, "Hollywood Costume" is shown through January 27, 2013. The exhibit explores the central role costume design plays in cinema storytelling. Bringing together over one hundred movie costumes from across a century of filmmaking, one can see the clothes worn by characters such as Dorothy Gale, Indiana Jones, Scarlett O'Hara, Jack Sparrow, Holly Golightly, and Darth Vader.

THE SWEDISH NATIONAL MUSEUM hosts "Slow Art" through January 20, 2013. The exhibit celebrates a contemporary movement in fine craft where technique, materials and the work process are considered especially important. Some thirty silver, textile, glass, and ceramic objects, all of them unique and crafted with care, are on display. Inherent in the slow process of creation is respect for the audience—the kind of respect that is often lacking in today's modern society, dominated by mass production and mass consumption.
