### Man arrested after gunshot in quarrel

PLEASANT PRAIRIE A domestic dispute in which a gunshot was fired led to a man's arrest early Wednesday morning.

William Stark, 33, of Winthrop Harbor, Ill., allegedly yelled and pushed the caller, reports said. Then, Stark allegedly retrieved a loaded handgun, and during the course of a struggle over the gun, a single shot was fired.

Pleasant Prairie officers were able to talk Stark into coming out of the residence. He was arrested without incident on suspicion of domestic violencerelated battery, disorderly conduct and recklessly endangering safety.

### City panel to review cancer center plan

Aurora Health Care's plan to build a cancer center on Kenosha's far-west side will go before the city Plan Commission today.

The commission is reviewing a conditional use permit for a 61,082-squarefoot medical building at 118th Avenue and 68th Street. That is considerably larger than Aurora's August 2012 announcement that it would build an 11,000-square-foot facility.

The new center is to house outpatient oncology services in a partnership with Franklin, Tenn.-based IASIS Healthcare, as well as pain services and ophthalmology facilities.

The commission meets at 5 p.m. in the Kenosha Municipal Building, 625 52nd St. The agenda also includes a conditional use permit for a new McDonald's restaurant, to be built at 12214 75th St.
