Program Wednesday features artists from RAM exhibit

RACINE — Racine Art Museum (RAM) will present a free community interest program spotlighting artists from the current RAM exhibition, "All in the Family." Emerging artists Kelly and Kyle Phelps will discuss their sculptural work from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 12, at the Golden Rondelle Theater, 1525 Howe St. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m.

"I produce art to externalize the forms springing from my own curiosity," she wrote. "My images reveal a fascination with the human face and body, and with the manipulation and repetition of form."
