Aug. 5 offers another enlightening opportunity - this one related to our cover story this week about what's going on at the Racine Art Museum. In addition to the many interesting things happening inside the museum at 441 Main St., those walking past RAM's Fifth Street windows will soon notice some unusual flowers cropping up in the gallery there.

Wisconsin artist Jessica Calderwood's "Fictitious Flora" exhibit will open in RAM's Windows on Fifth Gallery next Friday, in conjunction with Downtown's First Friday event. And, the museum is offering a chance to meet the artist behind these fantastic forms at a special, behindthe-scenes program, led by RAM's curator

of exhibitions, Lena Vigna, at 6:30 p.m. on Aug. 5. Those interested in attending the meet-the-artist program are encouraged to arrive early, as capacity is limited.

Admission to RAM is free on the first Friday of each month, with extended hours from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. The museum also offers a free, Hands-On Art Activity on First Fridays, and the theme for the Aug. 5 activity is "How Does Your Garden Grow? All ages are invited to explore their own creativity during this program, which runs from 4 to 8 p.m. at the Downtown museum.
