Watercolor show at Wustum Museum

RACINE - "Watercolor Wisconsin," now in its 55th year, is on view through April 23 at Charles A. Wustum Museum of Fine Arts, a campus of the Racine Art Museum at 2519 Northwestern Ave.

"Watercolor Wisconsin" is an annual statewide competition that has been organized by the museum since 1966.

Limited only by their materials - aqueous media such as acrylic and watercolor - artists are free to create two- and threedimensional works on paper. Contemporary artists bring both traditional and experimental approaches to the established guidelines, resulting in a varied and dynamic exhibition each year.

More than 50 years of "Watercolor Wisconsin" exhibitions have established Wustum Museum as a center for watercolor activity in the Midwest. Encouraged to experiment and explore the potential of painting on paper, the artists in this show have created works as diverse as their own imaginations.

Jurors Sarah Cox and Carole Hennessy selected the 110 works by 97 artists on display in this exhibition.

Cox is manager of exhibitions and collections at Elmhurst Art Museum. Hennessy is president of the Watercolor Honor Society and an internationally recognized watercolor artist.
